





WITH DANIEL MCCORMICK (GRADUATED '12)





Q1: Hello, please introduce yourself!

My name is Daniel McCormick and I am a former student of The University of Aberdeen. I graduated with a BSc honours in Geology & Petroleum Geology in July 2012.

Q2: What have you been doing since you left University?

Since Graduating, I have been working primarily in an offshore environment where I have been lucky enough to acquire a sound understanding of Wellsite and Drilling Operations.

I started my career as a Logging Geologist with Halliburton, monitoring Drilling Operations in Real-Time and analysing, interpreting and processing cuttings sample from the Wellsite. After a year with Halliburton I moved to Baker Hughes where I became a Consultant Data Engineer/Logging Geologist predominantly working in the Southern North Sea where my main duties were to create and interpret Formation, Drilling, Pressure and Gas logs, as well as Pore pressure analysis.

After 2 years in the Industry I was approached by Ikon Science who are one of the world leaders in Pore Pressure Prediction and Geopressure based studies. I accepted a job as a Pore Pressure Geologist/Analyst where I was responsible for the monitoring and calculating of Pore Pressure in Real Time. Working with Ikon provided me with incredible opportunities and training and now in my current capacity as a Real – Time Pore Pressure Specialist for Weatherford Consulting, I have the privilege of utilizing the skills I have acquired whilst previously working in an offshore/onshore environment. I would highly recommend any fellow Geology graduates to follow a similar career path to myself and gain experience working offshore. I have travelled/worked in several different countries where I have met lots of great people with every trip offering a new challenge and a new experience.

As a former Personal Trainer Fitness Instructor, I have always had a passion for sport and exercise and still try to keep as fit as I possibly can whether it be hitting the gym, going for a run or playing football.

Q3: Did the AGA support you financially during your undergraduate studies?

During my time at University, myself and my peers were lucky enough to be presented with free compass clinometers and hand lenses which were graciously supplied by the AGA society and helped with our studies and field trips for the duration of our undergrad.

Q4: Have you attended any AGA fundraising events before or after graduating?

I try to attend as many AGA events as I can when I'm not away working offshore or abroad, to not only raise money for the AGA, but to keep in contact with former peers and colleagues. I particularly enjoy the Granite City Ball, Burns Night Ceilidh and the Wine Tasting nights. They are a great laugh and it's awesome seeing everyone together.

Q5. Since leaving University, have any AGA events allowed you to reconnect with your peers or lecturers from your University?

During my time at University I met some really awesome people and I try to keep in contact with as many of them as I can, whether it be a "quiet" few drinks in the pub or game of 5s at a weekend. However I feel that events sponsored and hosted by the AGA are brilliant for allowing this to happen as you are able to see many of your former peers/lecturers and generally everyone has a beasting time.
