Rev Marylee Anderson [00:12:45] Our reading comes from Mark 13 verses 24 to 37.

Then they will see the Son of Man coming in clouds with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven. From the fig tree learn its lesson. As soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near at the very gates. Truly, I tell you. This generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. But about that day or hour, no one knows, neither the angels in heaven nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert for you do not know when the time will come. Rev Marylee Anderson [00:15:09] This week in Advent, we are asked to think about what it means to wait, waiting isn't easy and perhaps at the moment we have a new appreciation for just how hard and difficult having to wait can be. We are used to a world where everything is at our fingertips. We live in a world of easy downloads, instantaneous email, even our food brought to our doorsteps, and yet we are asked to wait. Some of us are waiting for news of work. We wait for restrictions to change. Some of us are waiting for results of tests. We wait to embrace our friends and family. Waiting is difficult, waiting is tiresome. Waiting and faith go hand in hand because we wait in anticipation of what is to come and these scriptures remind us that we are to wait, but also be alert, we are called to be spiritually alert, waiting for Christ to come. And if we remain alert, we will recognise Christ as he enters the room, we will see Christ when he shuffles by us on the street, we will see Christ in love and kindness shared. We are called to be advent people; watching, waiting. So may we all be spiritually alert, may we watch for the light that shines in the darkness as we wait expectantly for Christ to come around the corner and be manifest in ways we could never imagine.
