Sometimes referred to as the 'goodnight prayer of the Church', Compline rounds off the day and prepares us for a quiet night. As the psalmist wrote: *I lie down in peace and take my rest for it is in God alone that I dwell unafraid*.

The Lord Almighty grant us a quiet night and a perfect end. Amen. Our help is in the name of the Lord: who made heaven and earth.
