

Walter Scott will show you what to do.



I dare na stir a leg;


Though wishing sair to stretch my arms

And jugs at either hand.




## Poems sometimes rhyme

Though tired of standing all this time


I dare na stir a leg;

I canna move a peg.


Words rhyme when they have the same sounds
