## Editorial Introduction: 1<sup>st</sup> Granite Postgraduate Symposium: Engaging the Intersections of Humanity and Technology

In April 2016, the first Granite Symposium was held at the University of Aberdeen. The day long event was born out of a dual desire for what the Granite Journal could offer its community. Firstly, we sought to give graduate students, across the disciplines at the university, the chance to present their research to peers they may not generally engage with in their studies. This volume contains four of the papers presented at the symposium. We hope that as readers attend to each paper, they will find threads of commonality amid the different disciplines. Academic inquiry is built upon the curiosity fostered by engagement in topics from different viewpoints, and the Granite Symposium contributes to that endeavour and will hopefully continue in the coming years.
