

WHAT YOU NEED TO SUBMIT

- I.An example of a teaching or assessment challenge posed, or opportunity for innovative development;
- 2. How you addressed this challenge/opportunity for innovation;
- 3. Details of how you found your solution/idea for innovative development (for example from the literature, through teamwork, through staff training etc); DOESN'T HAVE TO BE EDUBABBLE!
- 4. Details of how your solution/innovative development has been/will be communicated to colleagues and/students; EXTERNAL?
- 5. Key learning points from your experiences, including any lasting impact on teaching in the future;
- 6. Your plan for evaluating/results of evaluating your solution/innovation.

CRITERIA

- Maximum word counts for each section of the proforma.
- Get a critical friend to look at what you have written they have to be honest with you are you actually addressing the criteria?
- Is your evidence weak? How might you take practical steps to strengthen it?
- Get someone to brainstorm with you about the impact/reach your innovation has had sometimes they are better than you at recognizing your good work.

EVIDENCE

- Metrics
- SCEF comments/ratings not usually enough
- Can you demonstrate impact or reach?
- Avoid naïve comments that you wouldn't let a student off with
- Quotes/popularity contest data are not enough
- Can you see whether there has been an effect on student attainment?
- Has you approach been used by anyone else?

THINGS TO BE WARY OF

- Having published a paper is not enough on its own.
- Edubabble is not enough on its own.
- Being popular and having nice SCEF results are not enough on their own
- 'my colleagues/students/friends think it's great." PROVE IT in a way that would be convincing during peer-review.
- Not exploiting all the resources/data you have e.g. do you have statistics, engagement times, attainment data buried somewhere like MyAberdeen that you could harness without much effort/expense?

PRACTICAL THINGS YOU CAN DO TO GET AN APPLICATION READY

- Log ALL of your activities on PURE. Include free texts of things that you can. Put in pdfs of posters etc get your name known and your ideas in circulation.
- Join forces with someone else can you help each other in the execution or dissemination of innovations/scholarship work?
- Think about what metrics/evidence you might need. What do others use? Not just in your own field can you adapt the approaches of others?
- Can you exploit our new world that embracing online conferences etc to better engage with your discipline's educational community?
- Can you work with students as partners to help you innovate?

- You need to gather evidence
- You need to get tactical
- You need to identify practical things you can do to increase your profile, reputation, reach and impact.
- Get involved with committees, panels, reviewing activities etc – doesn't always have to be high-profile journals.
- Often you are doing things to save in credit in the bank for an application months/years ahead.
- Be positive! Teachers can do anything!
