Welcome

From the origins of our species to the events of yesterday, Archaeology is the only discipline that offers you the human past in its entirety. It is a subject that actively shapes our understanding of our human past through discovery and insights made in the field, the lab, or the library.

Archaeology at Aberdeen has a distinctive northern flavour, focusing on Scotland, Northern Europe, Scandinavia, Northeast Asia, the North Atlantic and high latitude regions of North America.

Closer to home, our staff and students take full advantage of our setting amongst some of the richest archaeological remains in the UK, with excursions to ancient monuments and museums throughout Scotland.

In seeking to understand how ancient people lived their lives, structured their world, and engaged with their environment, archaeologists ask the big questions that can provide us with the tools to tackle global challenges in the present.

Our courses cover subjects such as Scottish archaeology, the origins of modern humans, colonisation of the North, history and theory of archaeology, osteoarchaeology, bioarchaeology and excavation and research skills.

In the Honours years, there is an emphasis on field and research skills, with a required fieldwork component. A dissertation provides students with the opportunity to tackle an original piece of research.

Students are strongly encouraged to undertake appropriate field or placement work, excavation-based or otherwise, to gain practical skills and staff currently involved in research are happy to advise and help with such opportunities.



Degree Programmes

At Aberdeen, you can choose between studying archaeology either as a Bachelor of Science (BSc) or Master of Arts (MA) degree programme.

The main difference between the BSc and MA programmes is in the subsidiary subjects taken alongside archaeology. For the BSc, these will be mainly science subjects, while MA students generally take subsidiary courses in the humanities and social sciences.

Both programmes are professionally accredited by CIfA (the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists) and you will have an opportunity to register as a Student Member and continue as an Affiliate Member when you graduate.

Degree Structure

In your first year, you will take two archaeology courses for an introduction to the study of archaeology and archaeological methods:

- Archaeology in Action
- Caves to Kingdoms: An Introduction to Prehistoric Archaeology

In your second year, you will delve deeper into archaeology with the following four courses:

- Prehistoric Britain: from Boxgrove to Bede
- Test Tubes and Trowels: An Introduction to Archaeological Science
- Past Lives
- The Archaeology of The North: Lifeways & Cultural Change

In year 3, students undertake specific training in field methods and post-excavation analysis with the following courses:

- Archaeological Fieldwork Portfolio
- Professional Archaeology I: Field Methods
- Archaeological Research Project Part 1
- Professional Archaeology II: Post-Excavation Analysis and Employment

In year 4, students are required to write a dissertation, which is an original piece of supervised research of approximately 12,000 words, on an archaeological topic of your choosing. In addition, students also take our capstone course - Current Issues in Archaeology - which explores current topics from domestication and climate change to community archaeology and death.

Alongside your archaeology courses, you will also select courses from other subject areas across the University.

Research-led Teaching

Active research is an important part of your degree training. Our medieval campus setting, combined with our location at the heart of the wonderful archaeological landscape of the northeast of Scotland means that our students enjoy easy access to an unrivalled number of archaeological sites and museums collections, including our extensive collections of human and animal bones with our laboratories. Students have also previously participated in fieldwork throughout Scotland, as well as in Alaska and Mongolia.

You will also be able to attend lectures and seminars given by scholars visiting the University, and lectures organised by the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland in Aberdeen.

Accredited Degrees



The Department of Archaeology at the University of Aberdeen is the first archaeology department in Scotland to have its degree programmes accredited by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIFA) and University Archaeology UK (UAUK).

Accreditation is awarded to those degree programmes that are deemed to provide the relevant professional skills needed for a career in the historic environment. Choosing an accredited degree, therefore, gives you the best possible springboard to develop a career in commercial archaeology.



Careers

The archaeology curriculum is designed to equip graduates with a range of professional skills that will prepare them for a career in archaeology and many other professions. Professional contract-based archaeology is now a multi-million pound business in the UK. Employment can also be gained in the museum and heritage sector; in education and historic environment agencies; in natural heritage agencies; as well as in research, planning, and the media.

The degree programme also encourages the development of critical thinking, research design, field methods, data analysis and communication methods - important transferable skills that make archaeology graduates highly employable in a variety of other fields.

An honours degree may also lead to a higher postgraduate degree, such as a PhD. Moreover, a degree in archaeology will not only help your employment prospects, but it will also open up new and exciting horizons on the world around you.
