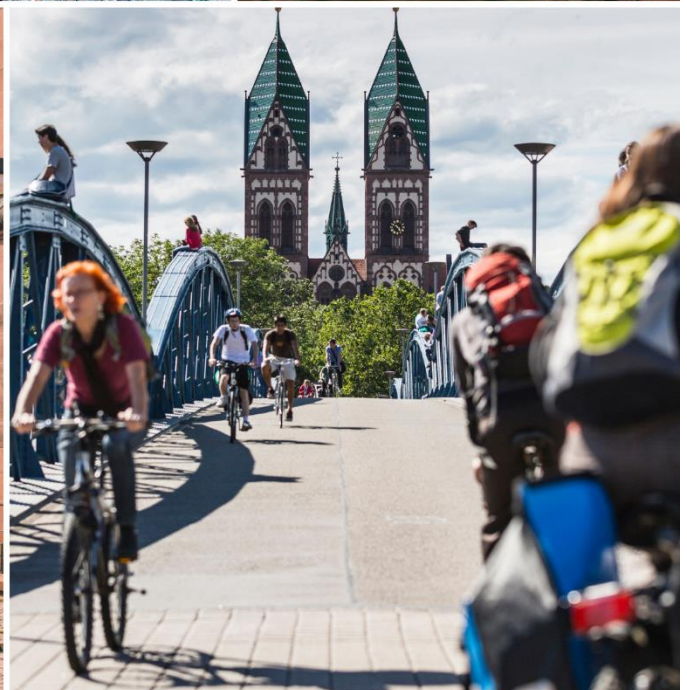

The Law Faculty

The Faculty of Law was one of the historical cornerstones of the University, which was founded in 1457. Under Ulrich Zasius (1461-1535), the author of the new city constitution of Freiburg in 1520, it flourished and experienced a golden age during the period of humanism at the beginning of the 16th century.

The Faculty of Law at the University of Freiburg offers a wide range of study options. In addition to the standard undergraduate program of legal studies leading to the first state examination, which consists of university exams in specialized areas as well as the German state examination in mandatory areas, many additional qualifications can be obtained while continuing to study for a regular degree. Advanced courses are available for graduate students, namely the trinational EUCOR Masters, the LL.M., the Franco-German Double Master of Law, and a doctoral program.

The faculty pursues collaborations at an institutional level with the Max Planck Institute for the Study of Crime, Security and Law, and with the Department of Informatics at the Karlsruhe Institute of Technology. It has further links with the Freiburg Ernst Mach Institute (Fraunhofer IMI) via the university's Centre for Security and Society (CSS).



Freiburg and the surrounding area

Study in a place where others spend their holidays

Situated between the Upper Rhine Valley and the Black Forest, what makes Freiburg stand out in particular is its proximity to a wide range of natural landscapes. The nearby mountain known as the Feldberg is ideal for mountain biking and hiking, while in the winter it is a popular ski resort. Another popular region close by, the Kaiserstuhl, attracts visitors for its vineyards. The banks of the river Dreisam offer a relaxing oasis that runs through the city. The fact that Freiburg is located in the tri-border region with France and Switzerland means that the city is just a stone's throw from Basel and Strasbourg, giving it an international feel. Narrow cobbled streets, old houses, and Freiburg's well known "Bächle" (small water channels along the streets) play their role in creating the Mediterranean atmosphere of Germany's warmest city.



The many street cafes around the law faculty are packed with people from all over the world as soon as the first rays of sunshine appear. The city's image is also shaped by the students of the centrally located university, while a broad cultural scene offers a diverse program.

EUCOR

In the heart of Europe, tradition meets innovation. In the tri-national Upper Rhine region, shared by Germany, France, and Switzerland, five universities within a radius of only 200 kilometers have founded the European Campus. Within the framework of Eucor - the European Campus, the universities offer joint degree programs in the natural and social sciences as well as the humanities. This means that students can complete a program

designed by two or more universities, which will then jointly award the degree (double or triple degree).

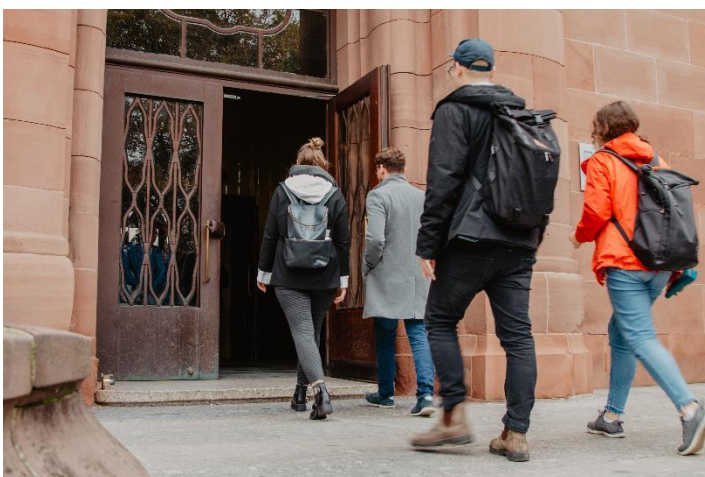
Students can also attend classes or complete modules at one or more partner universities. In agreement with their academic advisors at their home and partner universities, the credits (ECTS points) they earn at other universities can be transferred to their home university. The home university also provides financial support for travel expenses.

How to learn German

Language Teaching Centre/SLI

The *Sprachlehrinstitut*/Language Teaching Centre (SLI) is in charge of organizing and conceptualizing the entire program of language courses for students of all faculties on behalf of the Faculties of Philology and Philosophy. The SLI is the university's own language school. There are free German courses during the semester and inexpensive intensive courses. The SLI can also help you prepare for your studies in Freiburg. Each semester, the SLI offers a wide range of different language courses and language tests. Small groups and intensive supervision by expert teachers ensure a high level of learning success. The digitalized language laboratory offers multimedia lessons and is



open to all students and course participants for self-study. The SLI offers conceptual support and tailor-made courses to institutions and partners of the University of Freiburg. In addition, it organizes conferences, congresses and workshops on language policies and language teaching.

Tandem Language Learning

Tandem language learning is a way of exchanging languages and cultures through a language partnership.
