# Why is Theology and Religion at the University of at Aberdeen the best choice for me?

Theology and Religion has been taught at the University of Aberdeen since 1495. Like in other ancient universities, our students are taught within our Divinity department and are affectionately known as 'Divines'. Most students take a degree in Theology and Religion but if you wish to, or if training for ministry is your aim, you can take a degree in Divinity.

Theology and Religion is ranked 1st in the UK for research by the Research Excellence Framework (REF) 2021.

Through the highest-quality teaching and research, you can explore all aspects of theology and religion. You'll join an international community of students and leading academics carrying forward over 500 years of tradition. Whether you want to study theology for personal, vocational or intellectual reasons, the University of Aberdeen is the place for you.

### Explore your interests

## A variety of approaches to study

Our Theology and Religion degree pathways involve the study of religion in its theological, historical, philosophical, literary, institutional and contemporary contexts. There are also Joint Degree opportunities which combine study of Theology and Religion with other disciplines.

### A day in the life of a Divinity student

Here is an example of a typical day as a 'Divine' studying towards a degree in Theology and Religion:



### Jesus in History and Culture Lecture - 11:00

This course will examine the representations of Jesus that are found in the four canonical gospels as well as in a selection of non-canonical (apocryphal) gospels. By evaluating the evidence of such witnesses and reading this against the social and cultural backdrop of first-century Palestine, the module will consider the question of what "the Historical Jesus" was really like and how this figure relates both to the theological traditions of the church and to popular reworkings of the gospel stories through the centuries in art. literature and film.



### The Pilgrim City Lecture - 13:00

This course traces the history of Christianity from its establishment as the religion of the Roman Empire to the period just prior to its arrival in the Americas in the 15th century.



☐ Greek Language
(New Testament) - 15:00
This course will introduce students to the form of Greek found in the New Testament and help students to begin to read and write in ancient Greek.



Exploring the Tradition of Western Ethics Lecture - 16:00 How do we know right from wrong? What are our responsibilities towards others? How should we engage with social and political problems and issues? What constitutes a good life? This course provides an opportunity for students to explore the rich tradition of Western ethical reflection and moral formation. It does so by surveying the various ways in which ethics and morality have been understood and approached by major figures in the Western tradition.






## The Department of Divinity

In terms of employment skills, philosophy has taught me how to think critically and argue considerately, which I believe are necessary skills to have in many work places.


The course has taught me how to write clearly and concisely in order to get my point across in the strongest possible way, something I value when trying to communicate complex arguments.
