FULL TIME ROUTE

Stage 1

Candidates must take the following compulsory courses:

Candidates will select one course from the following electives:

PI5027 Religion, Conflict and Security (30 credit points)

PI5034 International Diplomacy Theory and Practice (30 credit points)

Stage 2

Candidates will select two courses from the following:

- PI5518 International Energy Security (30 credits)
- LS5549 The Use of Force in International Law (30 credit points)
- PI5520 Terrorism and Counter Terrorism (30 credit points)
- PI5521 Chinese Security Issues (30 credit points)

Stage 3

PI5901 Dissertation in Strategic Studies (60 credit points)

PART TIME ROUTE

This route will run over two years. Students can take up to 120 credit points in a single year. PD5006 must be taken in Year 1. PI5901 must be taken in Year 2.

The following courses are compulsory and can be taken in either Year 1 or Year 2:

PI5001 Strategic Theory (30 credit points)

Plus one course from the following electives:

- PI5027 Religion, Conflict and Security (30 credit points)
- PI5034 International Diplomacy Theory and Practice (30 credit points)

Plus candidates will select two courses from the following:

- PI5518 International Energy Security (30 credits)
- LS5549 The Use of Force in International Law (30 credit points)
- PI5520 Terrorism and Counter Terrorism (30 credit points)
- PI5521 Chinese Security Issues (30 credit points)

Assessment: By written examination, essay work and class presentation as prescribed for each course, and by submission of a dissertation. The degree of MSc shall not be awarded to a candidate who fails to achieve a CGS grade of D3 or above in PI5901, irrespective of their performance in other courses.
